FOUNDATIONAL TRAINING

HV Domestic Violence: Healthy Moms; Happy Babies

The curriculum provides training, tools, and resources to help home visitation staff address the complex and sometimes uncomfortable issue of domestic violence. When it comes to promoting health and safety outcomes for women and children impacted by domestic violence, there is a methodology to effective assessment, primary prevention, and anticipatory guidance messaging during home visits.

What one says and how it is said—whether by direct assessment or through universal education—matters and can make a difference for women and children living with domestic violence. First, home visitation professionals need education about the impact of violence on families. They also require tools to support assessment and conversations about domestic violence. This curriculum provides simple tools to support assessment and education through the use of scripts and safety cards during home visits. These tools have been designed to facilitate safety planning and supported referrals to domestic violence programs.

HV HOME Inventory Workshop

This full-day updated, interactive session provides information needed to effectively implement the H.O.M.E. Inventory in HV programs. Topics include: the purpose of the tool, research & validity, understanding the subscales, interviewing techniques, scoring and interpretation (including practice scoring an inventory), benefits for families and programs, re-calibration for valid and reliable data collection, and how programs can use the data for outcome-based reporting.

During this time foundational concepts related to trauma and trauma informed care will be discussed along with knowledge, skills and strategies for family engagement, assessment, professionalism, professional growth / development and safety will be explored.

HV Great Beginnings Start Before Birth- Updated 2016

This is the new updated version (2016) of this training developed through Healthy Families America. The prenatal & neonatal periods offer valuable windows of opportunity for the home visitor to establish a trusting relationship w/ a family, & focus intently on the needs of the mother and father as they transition into their new roles. In this training, home visitors will receive information & strategies to support the parents in enhanced prenatal bonding, stimulating fetal brain development, & reducing personal stress to increase healthy birth outcomes. Topics include: fetal development, from preconception through birth; maternal health; father involvement in pregnancy & the neonatal periods; & trauma- informed practice during pregnancy & delivery.

MODEL IMPLEMENTATION TRAINING

Parents as Teachers Foundational Training

This 3-day training lays the foundation for the Parents as Teachers approach to home visitation within an early childhood system. Coursework centers around 3 main areas of emphasis: parent-child interaction, development-centered parenting, & family well-being. Cost to access the online Foundational Curriculum is included in the training fee. Successful completion of Foundational Training results in approved use of the Foundational Curriculum. Individuals from affiliated programs can continue on to Model Implementation Training to achieve model certification. Foundational Training is encouraged but not required for new supervisors.

HV Parents as Teachers: Foundational 2 (3-K) training

This interactive, face-to-face training gives participants a better understanding of what it means to partner, facilitate and reflect with parents whose children are growing in independence and abilities as they approach school entry. It includes topics such as approaches to learning, neuroscience, child development, developmental concerns, transitions to early care and education and family engagement. The Foundational 2 Curriculum: 3 Years through Kindergarten is a continuation of the Parents as Teachers approach for those serving families with children ages 3 to 6. The digital book is similar in structure to the Foundational Curriculum, with hundreds of parent educator resources, parent handouts and activity pages around: Child Development, Parenting Behaviors, Parent-Child Interaction, Development-Centered Parenting, Family Well-Being

ONGOING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

HV- Cultural Humility

"More than a concept, Cultural Humility is a communal reflection to analyze the root causes of suffering and create a broader, more inclusive view of the world. Originally developed by doctors Melanie Tervalon and Jann Murray-Garcia (1998), to address health disparities and institutional inequalities in medicine, Cultural Humility is now used in social work education, public health and nonprofit management. It is a daily practice for people to deal with hierarchical relationships, changing organizational policy, and building relationships based on trust. Participants will be asked to read an article prior to participating in the workshop."

HV Perinatal Depression Algorithm for Home Visitors

Prerequisite: Perinatal Mood Disorders Training or training on the Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale This session will provide advanced training on how to support parents that may be experiencing perinatal depression. An algorithm was developed to provide a concrete guide for assessing client functionality, interpreting and explaining results, responding to concerning screening results and initiating a safety plan if needed. The session will provide strategies and opportunities to practice skills to further develop confidence to have these conversations and implement strategies necessary to support the parent and family.

HV - Legal Issues, Training for Family Support Professionals

The basics of family law in Wisconsin, emphasizing issues that low-income single parent households may experience, including paternity establishment, child support collection/enforcement, and the intersections of domestic violence and family law. This training will include an overview of recent law changes to child support cooperation/paternity establishment and to domestic violence restraining orders, discuss resources available for HV clients seeking divorces, custody and placement challenges, and emphasize resources available for HV clients experiencing DV, including LAW Overview of the different kinds of public and subsidized housing available in Wisconsin and its availability (or lack thereof), and basics of application, recertification/review processes, and public housing evictions/terminations, with emphasis on how HV staff can help families with public or subsidized housing maintain that support. As well, the training will provide an overview of eviction prevention for those in private rental housing, including an overview of the different types of notices tenants receive, when to contact LAW for help preventing eviction, and ways HV staff can help families maintain private rental housing. Content in this training will also include a brief overview of other benefits and what home visiting professionals and others can do to support families to access and maintain access to these benefits.

HV Sentinel Injuries

This session will build off the online introductory knowledge to deepen participants' understanding of sentinel injuries, and the role that they can play in early detection and intervention. This session will utilize case examples and discussions, and provide participants with resources that they can utilize in their work. This session provides critical information for professionals to identify potential risk of child abuse in infants.

HV Early Childhood Development

HV FAN - A Framework for Engagement and Reflective Practice Session for Direct Service Professionals (\$150)

The nationally recognized FAN framework was developed by Linda Gilkerson of the Erickson Institute to support professionals in the areas of engagement and reflective practice through increased attunement and effectiveness in the interactions we have with families. This training is for agency teams consisting of staff, supervisor and/or mental health consultant.

It will include monthly coaching calls for supervisors and submission of implementation tools. Each staff person will complete 2 tools each month to be discussed with their supervisor.

HV FAN - A Framework for Engagement and Reflective Practice Supervisor Session (\$150)

Supervisors will participate in lunch conversations during the first two days of training and will receive an additional hour of training beyond that of staff on day 2 at the end of the day. Supervisors will also receive and participate in both individual and group coaching calls each month between the first two days of training and the third day of training. Please note that this is not the supervisory session targeted at providing the foundational training for reflective supervision but rather teaches the framework for direct service and teaches the process to supervisors w/additional content to help supervisors support team implementation.

HV Motivational Interviewing - Series (\$300) [11387](#) (Milwaukee, WI)

This 3 part series exposure training provides a background on MI theory and research, including how and why behavior change occurs. MI is presented as a guiding style of communication and contrasted with other methods of behavior change. Learners are introduced to the basic practice elements of MI, including the Spirit (Partnership, Evocation, Acceptance, Compassion), OARS Skills (Open questions, Affirmation, Reflection, Summary) and fundamental processes (Engaging, Focusing, Evoking, Planning). Engaging will be the featured MI process in this workshop. Through discussion, videos, and experiential exercises, learners will begin developing an MI practice. In addition to your active participation in the workshop activities, successful completion of the course requires 3 audio-recordings. Participants will capture 2 of the recordings during workshop time. The final recording, with a client, will be due one month after the course closes in order to receive credit for the course.

SUPERVISOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Reflective Supervision for Child and Family Services

The FAN framework, developed by Linda Gilkerson at the Erikson Institute, is utilized in a variety of settings across the nation including home visiting, Part C (Birth to Three), with medical residency programs, child welfare, court systems and others. It provides a framework and concrete strategies to support a structure for Reflective Supervision, attunement in the supervisory interaction along with reflection for increased self-awareness with the purpose of improving one's practice skills. This session will discuss the use of the ARC, the Core Processes and provide tools to support implementation after the training.

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
